Resiliency Planning Underway

On April 18, 2016, the City & County of San Francisco released *Resilient SF – Stronger Today, Stronger Tomorrow*, a strategic vision to build a more resilient San Francisco. *Resilient SF* was developed in partnership with the public, private, and nonprofit sectors, along with local community leaders and stakeholders.

San Francisco's Office of Resilience and Recovery (ORCP) was established in 2016 to institutionalize resilience as a civic priority. The Office oversees the Earthquake Safety Implementation Program and Lifelines Council, which plans for post-disaster recovery.

The Seawall Program plays a key role in supporting the goals outlined in the *Resilient SF* Report, including:

- Constructing a disaster-resilient waterfront by 2040
- Advance Citywide adaptation planning for sea level rise

How Does the Port Fit In?

The Port of San Francisco manages 7.5 miles of waterfront including the Embarcadero Seawall, which is the foundation of 500 acres of downtown San Francisco neighborhoods. The Seawall underpins critical infrastructure such as BART, Muni Metro and ferry transportation systems, critical utility infrastructure, and emergency response and recovery areas.
